

## ALL SAINTS OUTREACH MISSION OPPORTUNITIES

- 1. Harvey's Chapel is a Baptist Church in Mountain Pine that we support with donations for their summer camp for children, back to school supplies and Christmas gifts for children in their area. Participation has been with donations of money and supplies. **Contact: Martha Nichols**
- 2. Angel Tree is a Salvation Army project. Toys and clothes are donated by parishioners for children who probably would not otherwise receive much of anything at Christmas. **Contact: Margaret Buford**
- 3. Salvation Army Christmas Kettle Ministry is supported with volunteers to collect donations at the kettles in front of Walmart and Brookshires during December. **Contact: Blair Oram**
- 4. Jackson House is located in downtown Hot Springs. They operate a thrift store, food bank, and other support services for the homeless plus a soup kitchen which provides a lunch daily. We provide a kitchen team every other month on the 2nd Monday. Volunteers are used from the parish family. **Contact: Bob Mongrain**
- 5. Arkansas Chaplaincy at Oaklawn is a Christian Ministry providing spiritual guidance to the workers on the backside at the Oaklawn Race Track. They provide a church service every Tuesday night and a Bible Study on Wednesday evenings. They also operate a clothing ministry and food for those who need it. The racetrack workers are transient, going from track to track following the horses. **Contact: Joel Bailey**
- 6. Filly Feed Ministry is held every January to benefit the female workers on the backside at Oaklawn race course. Jewelry, cosmetic and toiletry donations are collected and put in bags to be sent to Oaklawn where the Chaplaincy hosts a luncheon and a shopping spree for the female workers who have very few opportunities to acquire those type items. **Contact: Deacon Sami Joe**
