We celebrate two new year calendars. January 1, 2024, begins a new Gregorian calendar year – a 365-day solar year that is determined by the Earth's revolution around the Sun. On December 3, 2023, we began our new Christian Church Year. It is based on the centrality of the Son of God. The Bible reveals the unfolding drama of the coming of the Son. He constructed a completely new document (Version 4) to incorporate the local requirements of the Church. A more detailed description of the background was sent along with the document via email. There are two copies available at the church should you want to read a paper version. The Annual Meeting should not be lengthy.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

UNFOLDING



Sunday School begins on January 21. This season Father Rick is going to lead us in a study to help us understand the Bible from creation to new creation. We will be using Dr. Zach Keele's book entitled: "*The Unfolding Word: The Story of the Bible from Creation to New Creation*". The goal of this study is to help us better understand how all 66 books tell one story about Christ. Dr. Zeele's book is well written, researched, and easy to understand. It not only does a wonderful job of helping us

understand the narrative shape of the Bible, but he does a beautiful job of explaining each book's historical context. It is necessary to buy the book for this study and read the chapter to be studied ahead of the class. The hope is that as we progress in the study, we will be excited and better equipped to dive deeper into our personal Bible reading with a clearer understanding of God's word. The book can be bought on Amazon.

NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION

Father Rick encouraged us at our last Sunday school session and to his letter to the Saints in this newsletter, to think about resolving this year to reading the Bible. Our class, "The Unfolding Word" is intended to help us do that, with the goal that at the end of the study we will have read the entire Bible. Each chapter in the book has the Bible books to be read for the chapter. Father suggested that we all have a personal study Bible, several are available. He uses the ESV, but the NIV, NKJV, etc., are all good. Because reading entire books of the Bible can be intimidating and time-consuming, he outlined a method he called "skim reading." At the beginning of each book of the study Bible is an introduction and outline of the book. Go through the outline to familiarize yourself with the book. Then, with the outline beside you, go through the book. Then, for our daily devotion, read part of a chapter in "The Unfolding Word" followed by the psalm of the day. The calendar for the reading of the daily psalm can be found in our prayer book on page 717 (we are in Year B). Should we resolve to follow this plan, by the end of this study we will have read all 66 books of the Bible. That's exciting!

EPIPHANY BEGINS JANUARY 6



What's Epiphany"? The word "epiphany" means "revelation." It is about God's revelation of his Son to all the nations. Epiphany begins each year with The Feast of the Epiphany on January 6. This is the day each year that we remember the coming of the magi who visited Jesus.

"Note how fitting was the order of events: the wise men saw the star, were received by the Jews and their king; they heard prophecy to explain what had appeared; the angel instructed them; and then they journeyed from Jerusalem to Bethlehem by the guidance of the star. From all this we learn that this was not an ordinary star, for no other star has this capacity to guide, not merely to move but to beckon, to go before them, drawing and guiding them along their way. The star remained after bringing them to the place, in order that the child might also be seen. For there is nothing conspicuous about the place. The inn was ordinary. The mother was not celebrated or notable. The star was needed to manifest and illumine the lowly place, until they had reached their destination at the manger." *St. John of Chrysostom, The Gospel of Matthew, Homily 7:3*

The season of Epiphany begins on January 6 and ends on Ash Wednesday (the first day of Lent). The season of Epiphany focuses on Jesus' revelation, on his light entering world.

"The season of Epiphany is an invitation to follow Jesus into the ways of gratitude and joy, We are no longer bound by the dissatisfaction of our consumer culture that tells us to keep striving for more stuff, more success, more money, more of everything for myself. Instead we are invited to learn to live in the joy and contentment of seeing every moment as a gift from God." *Brian O'Connell*

What does your Vestry do? The vestry meets once a month (second Thursday of the month). Members are always welcomed to attend. Father Rick opens the meeting with prayer before sharing his comments, calendar and announcements. Then each member gives his/her report. Notables from December meeting:

- Membership (active and inactive) is currently 61 members.
- Budget for 2024 was approved for vote at the annual meeting.
- Southern Flooring will install new carpet in Sherill Hall and the sacristy January 9-12.
- The Time and Talent Survey will be compiled and names given to appropriate chairs.
- End of year left \$1200 in the Outreach fund. Members agreed to send Herb and Mary Hand (missionaries in Northern Africa) \$500 to help with their relocation expenses; \$50 to Harvey's Chapel to help with their outreach programs; \$200 to Samaritan Ministries in Hot Springs to help with their program to help homeless men get back on their feet.
- A money market account was created to hold money for future unforeseen happenings.
- David Keyser will arrange first aid training and active shooter training for designated parishioners.
- A Greeter Team will be established to help welcome newcomers on Sunday.
- A need to be present at the POA Newcomers events led to assigning Virginia Smith to recruit members and organize monthly representation.
